If you've been at any of our GoMAD events, there's a fair chance you'll have witnessed the team and children signing this song. Not only singing, but also SIGNING. It is incredibly moving to see and, if you can, to join in and sign.

The words trace the story of the cross - of the mess we make, our brokenness, what the Bible calls sin. It also describes how God reaches to us, arms spread on a cross, so that, in love, He can bring us back into relationship. The restoration is enabled by God's grace - His unlimited, unfathomable love which He lavishes upon us even though we do not deserve it and cannot earn it.

Oh, amazing grace, You took my place Now I am changed by Your mercy, Your kindness.

In these days of Lent (the weeks leading up to Easter), I have been helped to think about the incredible price Jesus paid so that I could be changed, rescued, forgiven and set free. What has helped me? The question really needs to be "WHO has helped me?" It has been the pupils in our local Primary School! We've explored the emotions of Holy Week, the final days of Jesus' life.



Using images created by my colleague, the Rev. Stephen Ogston of Luce Valley Parish, the older pupils have traced how Jesus, the disciples, some of Jesus' closest friends, and the religious leaders might have felt.

The joy of Palm Sunday, the shock as Jesus cleared out the Temple, the confusion as Jesus spoke of HIs betrayal and death; the agony of Gethsemane, the fear as Jesus is condemned, the heartbreak as He died. The waiting, the weeping of Saturday; the bewilderment and ecstasy of Easter Day.

I suspect I'd become a bit over-familiar with the Gospel accounts - after all, I've celebrated Easter for 5 decades and the story doesn't change. This year, though, I'VE been changed. I've journeyed through that week as if seeing it for the first time helped by some 10 and 11 year olds.

The Crèche

We stay in church until after Family Time when we hear about the day's story and then we continue to work









FPIC and Crossover

Every Sunday, our P6, 7 and secondary school pupils meet in the Church centre to join in the first part of the service.

We then move into a different part of the Church complex to explore the Bible passage in more detail through games, activities and discussion.

It's a lively and engaged group who are always keen to learn more and understand how to apply the Bible lesson in today's setting. There's always good chat as we unpack the stories..... and an abundance of sweets too!

The Youth Groups, age appropriate, meet every Sunday during the Church service and BB on Friday. All have healthy numbers.


The Baby and Toddler Group meets on Monday morning from 9.45 -11.30am.

Food banks provide free, nutritionally balanced, tinned, and dried food to those who need it. This might include people who have been hit by an unexpected financial crisis, such as redundancy,

unexpected bills, or the fallout from the coronavirus pandemic.

Care professionals, such as social workers, school staff, and health visitors, identify those in need of help and give them a food voucher for their local food bank. This voucher provides a food parcel of three days' worth of non-perishable food from the bank. Other problems, such as rising period poverty, mean that food banks also accept and offer donations of toiletries within the parcel.

But as well as providing these emergency items, food banks work so that people don't need to use them again. Specialised members of staff can provide additional support to help people resolve problems with their finances, such as debt, mental health issues, and a lack of access to government benefits. Some banks also offer services like childcare and educational courses.

The Trussell Trust operates the most food banks in the UK, with 1200 food banks nationwide.

(The "East Dunbartonshire" in the logo at the top \bigcirc s of the page is where the food bank is - it's not run by East Dunbartonshire.)

On the last Sunday of each month people are invited to bring foodbank contributions to the church. Our local foodbank is in Kirkintilloch, and food is taken there on Monday.

Although we 'advertise' the collection as being on Sunday, all the items will be non-perishable, so contributions can be left at the church any time it's open.



Mary "cracks it"!!



Sit down together and enjoy peeling the foil wrapping off a hollow chocolate egg. Hold the egg in your hand.

Jesus' tomb was a bit like this egg – with the big stone rolled against the tomb entrance, inside it must have been dark and cramped. It's as if the darkness makes

it still Good Friday, the day that Jesus died.

But on the first Easter day, Jesus came alive again, and burst out of the tomb. Good Friday is broken once and for all, and new life is set free.

At this point, feel free to smash the egg and start eating the pieces. While you eat, keep going with thinking through the story.

But the trouble was, that nobody saw it happen. The soldiers who were guarding the tomb had fainted in fear, and the next thing we know, Mary arrives at Jesus' tomb and finds that it's empty. The actual moment of the resurrection happened in private. Imagine all that excitement and joy and nobody to share it!

On Easter Day we focus on Mary's story. There in the garden, the resurrection had already happened, but she was trapped in her own Good Friday – her grief and sadness kept her in the dark.

If you have another chocolate egg, peel off the wrapping together and hold it in your hand.

Just like the first egg, it's like Good Friday is still happening. It still felt like Good Friday to Mary.

When we read Mary's story we can tell the exact moment when the resurrection happened for her – it's when Jesus calls her name and she recognises him. Suddenly all her sadness is turned to joy. Mary's Good Friday is gone once and for all, the new life is set free in her.

Are YOU trapped in your own Good Friday? Or has the Resurrection happened for you?







Sunday Reflections



During January we met with Moses and the 10 Commandments. Julie quoted from "Just 10" by J.John. She doesn't agree with all he writes but it's still a good read.

John begins with number 10 (covetousness) & uses this quote. What's your reaction?

Money can buy medicine but not health; a house but not a home;

Companionship but not friendship; entertainment but not happiness; Food but not an appetite; a bed but not sleep; a crucifix but not a saviour.



Remember the Golden Calf? What are our "golden calves"?

The Israelites got a "second chance" with a 2^{nd} set of Commandments. Our God is the God of 2^{nd} chances. How many 2^{nd} chances have you had?

And we learned a new "10 Commandments Song" – has it helped you?

On 10 February we focussed on John 3:16 -

"For God so loved the world" -

and the preceding verse about Moses lifting up the "brazen serpent" in the wilderness. The serpent was the antidote to the Israelites' snake bites. Jesus is the antidote to our sin. Look to the cross and find forgiveness.



Lifted up was He to die; "It is finished" was His cry! Now in heaven, exalted high – Hallelujah! What a Saviour!

Climate Doom to Positive Action

In the midst of a climate emergency, surrounded by extreme weather, and with constant noise in the



media, it's very easy to get overwhelmed. If you feel like this, you are not alone; climate change anxiety is a relatively new term used to describe the feeling that many of us get when thinking about things like extreme temperatures and weather events. Recent research found that 59% of 16–25-year-olds surveyed said they were very or extremely worried about climate change. It's no surprise that this anxiety is becoming increasingly prominent.

The anxiety of Climate Doom can easily turn to bitterness. 'Why have all those in authority let us down in their lack of preparation and action to tackle climate change?' The anger, the frustration and the fear could really eat us up. But how do we get away from this?

⁶Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice. Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.' Ephesians 4:31-32 NIV

God askes us to be kind to one another and forgive one another but how does this help? By fixing the mind on what is good. By focusing on what we can do. By serving God through caring for creation. What can we change? How we can influence others, our church family, family and friends, Governments, big business? How can we be kind and compassionate to Creation? We can start with our own actions; here are some tips:-

• Avoid 'doom-scrolling' – if news and current events trigger feelings of anxiety you should try and limit your consumption.

• Get involved – it's been proven that taking active steps to volunteer, join advocacy groups or help out in your community can help you feel that your voice is being heard and tackle those



feelings of helplessness. There are several options available to suits your abilities and time here in Milton of Campsie. You could join the Eco Group to help develop ideas and deliver them within the church and community. You could take part in some of the campaigns we support or volunteer with the Rehomeing project. Or you could use the eco tips at home and the recycling bins in the church. There will be a way you can get involved.

• Pray. We must always continue to pray, to ask God for guidance and support in tackling this problem.

Dear Lord, you have created a glorious world for us to live in. Thank you for the all the wonders we get to enjoy. Help us to focus on the great things you have created and lead us to take much more care of it. Help us to raise our voices in support of action to tackle climate change. Help us not to become overwhelmed but to feel your love as we take steps to get involved and do more. Amen

Eco Group Update

Over the past few months, we have been very busy. We have encouraged everybody to take part in the Big Garden Bird Watch with RSPB, and the government consultation on Water, Wastewater and Flooding in Scotland in January



as well as planting 3 new trees in the church grounds. We made 130 green heart badges in February and sent them out to our MP and every MSP in Scotland for the Share the Love campaign. March brought 'Fair Fashion', a talk on textile care and recycling. And we encouraged the congregation to take part in The Big Plastic Count with Green Peace, and Earth Hour with WWF. There are loads of things happening to suit everybody so please do get involved. In the coming months we will be changing the group structure and name as we become part of the Treasure Team but our commitment to caring for creation and campaigning for action on the climate emergency will not change.





WHY CHANGE?

Much of our church activity over the past 30 years has been organised by 6 Workgroups (Mission, Communication, Worship, Education, Pastoral Care and Stewardship). Our new TEAMS are based on the 5 Marks of Mission - the staples of every church community. We want to be ALL FOR JESUS and we will use that as our benchmark as we engage in the 5 areas of Teach, Tell, Tend, Transform and Treasure.

WHO'S INVOLVED?




PRAY FOR OUR LOCAL SCHOOLS
